
Council Elects New Mayor

Town Councillors elected Robert Savage Mayor of Wymondham at the council meeting on Tuesday 2 May.

In his acceptance speech Mr Savage thanked the council for electing him Mayor for the coming year, and said that he considered it a great honour and privilege to hold the office. He thanked Cllr Joe Mooney for all the work he had put in as Town Mayor for the previous two years.

He noted that there were a number of ongoing projects, such as new Council offices, a 3G pitch at Ketts Park and soon a requirement for a new burial ground. Not least was the need to resolve the play equipment issue on Kings Head Meadow. He promised to continue to support local groups and organisations and to work with other local councils and statutory bodies, and help drive Wymondham forward whilst retaining its special character.

61-year old Mr Savage, a semi-retired self-employed structural engineer, has been a town councillor since 2011, and was previously

mayor during 2012-13. He is also a South Norfolk district councillor. At the meeting Tony Holden was elected deputy mayor for 2017-18.

More achievements for Kett's Books

Elected by other town councillors, Wymondham's new Mayor takes up his duties for 2017-18, having previously served in that role during 2012-13. Wymondham in Bloom is back to brighten up the town, with some ingenious and creative displays and a shield for the winner of a 'best display' competition. The Market Cross invites us to pay it a visit in its 400th anniversary year, and see what an amazing wealth of information it can provide. And if you are facing difficulties, the Help Hub can make your next step easier.

Wymondham in Bloom back to transform town!

It's that time of year when town centre businesses are encouraged to brighten up their shop fronts with impressive floral displays. That's right, Wymondham in Bloom (WIB) is back! The scheme's third year promises to transform the town centre again with hanging baskets, planters and window boxes bursting with flowers.

Wymondham in Bloom is a floral competition with funding from South Norfolk Council, allowing us to team up with Wymondham Garden Centre to give town centre businesses 50% off of hanging baskets, planters and everything they need to go with them. Businesses are free, however, to source their plants and hardware independently or grow their own.

Group treasurer Martin Ford said: "Over the past two years, we've seen all sorts of displays including flowers bursting out of shoes, wellington boots, furniture, suitcases and even bubble gum machines. It has really helped to add to the summer feel of the town and make Wymondham town centre a place to be proud of!"

Judging will be split between a judging panel and shopkeepers themselves. Voting slips will be delivered to all town centre businesses in early July. Completed voting slips can be handed in at Mad Hatter's Tea Shop or at Wymondham Garden Centre.

In addition, WIB representatives will be collecting them in during mid-July and one lucky voting shop keeper will receive a hamper of goodies!

Wymondham in Bloom winners will receive press coverage, being announced live on stage on Carnival Day (Sunday 23 July). First Prize winner will receive the Winners Shield and framed certificate. Second and third prize winners receive framed certificates too. There's also a category for most creative display!

How old is the Market Cross?

'How old is the Market Cross?' is a frequent question at Wymondham's tourist information centre.

When the enquirer is invited to guess, responses have ranged from 'one thousand years' to 'as old as Granny'!

Currently however there is an accurate short response, for the Cross was constructed in 1617-18 so is four-hundred years old: we have souvenir pencils to mark it. There is a limited number of these so perhaps buy one to use and one to keep...

If you haven't visited Wymondham Market Cross recently then please make the 400th anniversary a time when you do, to browse the many hundreds of leaflets about this area and beyond, view the maps and souvenirs for sale, collect local timetables or, especially if you are new to the area, ask a question about Wymondham. Above all, to enjoy the inside as well as the outside of this unique focal point of our town, and wish it 'Happy 400th Birthday'.

Centenary of Lions Club International

There has been a Lions Club in Wymondham for nearly 50 years but Lions Clubs International was founded as long ago as 1917. This year 1.3 million Lions in over 200 countries will be celebrating its centenary.

Among the Purposes of Lions Clubs are "to take an active interest in the civic, cultural, social and moral welfare of the community" and "to encourage service-minded people to serve their community without personal financial reward". Partisan politics and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.

Throughout the world, Lions Clubs have played major roles in improving the care of blind people, funding many thousands of cataract operations in Africa and Asia and sponsoring 'talking newspapers' (including the Wymondham and Attleborough group). The Lions Clubs International Foundation was formed in 1968, and has since channelled over £600 million to support Lions' humanitarian work including huge donations for tsunami and earthquake relief.

The Wymondham Club was formed in 1969 and has been raising funds and supporting local, regional, national and international good causes for nearly 50 years. In the

last 10 years alone the club has raised and donated over £70,000. Beneficiaries include the Wymondham Dementia Group, East Anglia's Childrens' Hospices, East Anglia Air Ambulance, Wymondham Music Festival, Star Throwers and hundreds of small donations to needy individuals and groups. For many years the Club ran the annual Dickensian Night just before Christmas and now organises Santa's Grotto at the Christmas Fayre.

For the last five years the Mayor of Wymondham has been an honorary member and the Club has been pleased to cooperate with other local organisations to improve the quality of life for our citizens.

Every penny that the Wymondham Club raises from public events and collections goes to a charitable purpose. The Club's running costs are small and are paid for by members' subscriptions. It is a registered charity No 1050430.

Wymondham Lions Club members come from all walks of life. Membership is open to anyone who wishes to play a role in supporting the community. The club meets on the last Monday of the month at 7.30 in The Feathers. **605311** will put you in touch with a Club member who will be pleased to provide further information.

Voluntary groups do sterling job, says retiring Mayor



Since my report last year the town council has started preparatory work on a number of projects such as the new council offices, the SNC/WTC 3G all-weather pitch project and the provision of new town cemetery. However, a lot of work remains to be done in order to bring these projects to fruition. The

council will, of course, keep you updated on progress during the coming year.

I am pleased that under the Brighter Wymondham badge the council decided to purchase additional planters. Working in partnership with Wymondham in Bloom the planters and hanging baskets will help to keep our town looking brighter and more colourful.

During the year a group of young people approached the council with a proposal to erect some boards in the Browick Road recreation ground for an arts project. The council supported the idea and the project should get under way quite soon. Well done to all concerned for working to bring this project to fruition.

I was pleased to present this year's Wymondham Town Council Civic Award to Wymondham couple Jennifer and Jim Cawte at a ceremony held at the

Wymondham Dell Bowls Club. At the presentation, covered elsewhere in this report, I paid tribute to their fund-raising work for good causes. They are a credit to Wymondham and in my view very worthy recipients of this year's award.

Once again I was delighted to welcome the school council from Robert Kett School to the Town Council Chamber after their annual visit to Becketts Chapel to lay flowers on the anniversary of the death of Robert and William Kett. This annual ceremony provides a reminder of tumultuous events in the town's history, while the Council Chamber visit gives insights into present day civic procedures.

My heartfelt thanks to everyone who sponsored my 40 mile cycle ride around Wymondham. I donated the £720 raised to my chosen charity for 2016-2017, the excellent Wymondham Diabetes UK Group. The proceeds will allow the group to carry on with their good work in the town and that for me is a good outcome of the ride. The group runs bi-monthly meetings where guest speakers talk about everything from insulin advice to driving with diabetes.

Finally, I would like to say how pleased I am that the Town Council continues to support the town's voluntary groups through its small grants scheme. Recipients for 2016-2017 are listed on page three of this annual report. All the voluntary groups in the town in their various ways do a sterling job to help keep Wymondham moving forward. Well done and thanks to them all!

Wymondham Town Council

How it works, what it does, where your money is spent

How does your Town Council work for you?

The 15 members of Wymondham Town Council are all unpaid volunteers, elected by Wymondham people every four years. Elections took place in May 2015 so that 2016-17 was the second year of office for the council. Each year the councillors elect a Mayor and Deputy Mayor from among their members.

The full Town Council meets on the first Tuesday of every month. It takes questions from the public, notes minutes from its committees and receives reports from representatives on outside bodies. It also approves all payments to suppliers from the preceding month and discusses issues relevant to the town.

Some of the Town Council's functions are delegated to three main committees and these meet on Tuesdays in accordance with the schedule published in 'About Wymondham' and on the council website. Each committee consists of five members who elect their own chair and vice chair. These committees are:

Leisure & Environment which supervises the maintenance, upkeep and improvement of the Council's recreation areas such as Ketts Park, Browick Road recreation ground and the Spooner Row playing field. It is responsible for ensuring that play equipment meets health and safety requirements and that residents have access to leisure facilities. It is also responsible for other open spaces such as the Tolls Meadow nature reserve, the Becketswell amenity area and the allotments.

Planning Lighting and Highways liaises closely with Norfolk County Council and South Norfolk Council on all road, pavement and lighting issues affecting the Wymondham parish. It takes a strategic planning overview for the town and works in conjunction with the county and district councils. While it does not grant planning approvals (normally the responsibility of South Norfolk Council) the Town Council is consulted on all applications affecting Wymondham.

Finance & General Purposes manages property owned or leased by the Council including the cemetery, allotments and the chartered Friday market. It is also allocates funds under the Council's small grants scheme and is responsible for machinery purchases and the Council's administration team. Its remit also includes the Grade 1 listed Market Cross and the provision of Tourist Information Centre facilities provided by the council staff.

Agendas are posted on the Town Council notice board and agendas and minutes for council meetings are published on the council website, and these indicate the starting time. Public participation is allowed at all meetings at the allocated time.

Planters brighten town centre



To brighten and improve the appearance of the town centre the Town Council some years ago purchased planters which have been placed in key locations around the town and Spooner Row.

These support the efforts made by the town's Wymondham in Bloom group and under the guidance

of Cllr Kevin Hurn (on right here with Martin Ward) a planting strategy has been drawn up to ensure that there is a good display of colour for the coming months.

A closer look at planning



Planning can be a complex and often contentious matter. The Town Council's Planning Lighting and Highways Committee works within a planning policy framework which explains how planning applications are dealt with, and how decisions are made.

South Norfolk Council has the final say in planning matters. Sometimes its Planning Committee will delegate decisions on appropriate cases to planning officers in consultation with local members. All applications are forwarded first to the Town Council for comment, and details of applications are posted on the council noticeboard. Plans are available for consultation in the office, or through the South Norfolk Council website, and considered at a council or committee meeting where they are on display for discussion.

Letters from the public commenting on applications are welcome, and time is always allowed at the start of meetings for public comments to be made in person. The Town Council will then comment to the district council in the light of the local plan and other policy guidance, taking into account any public comments and the considered views of its members.

Precepts, grants, income and expenditure – council finances explained

Where the money comes from, and where it goes, are set out in these two diagrams:



The Town Council is required by law to set a budget each year, which then determines how it is financed for that year.

Income is obtained from a number of sources such as market fees, leisure activity fees, burials, rents, grants and income on investments. It is also prudent for the Council to maintain a general reserve to cover emergencies together with earmarked reserves for specific projects.

The largest source of income is the precept, which in the 2016-17 financial year was £385,182 which was received together with a transitional grant of £24,101 from Central Government. For the present 2017/18 financial year the precept has been set at £413,383 with a transitional grant of £12,920.

Expenditure included the costs of maintaining the council offices at 14 Middleton Street and the salaries of the Town Clerk, administration support staff and groundsmen as well as the Tourist Information staff. The Town Council also maintains various amenity and play areas such as Ketts Park, Tolls Meadow and the Cemetery. Play equipment is replaced as part of a rolling programme of refurbishment.

Another important part of the council's work is in supporting local groups through our grants scheme. Each year the Town Council makes grants to local organisations to help with projects. Grants awarded in 2016-17 are shown in the box to the right.

Wymondham Vintage Day



Queen Street, next to the Baptist Church, was the focus of Wymondham's first Vintage Day, organised by Wymondham Town Team with Town Council support.

There was a display of classic cars on the Market Place and the Market Street car park, where there were vintage stalls including clothing, accessories, china and furniture.

The Baptist Church served vintage teas and hosted displays including collections of bygones, items from the Town Archive, police archive material, old photographs and a reminiscence stall. A vintage bus transported people to the Mid-Norfolk Railway diesel gala, Wymondham Abbey, Town Green, the Heritage Museum and the mainline railway station. Fine weather made it all just perfect!

New warden at Tolls Meadow

John Beckett has been appointed the new Voluntary Warden at the Town Council's Tolls Meadow nature reserve.

Toll's Meadow is a fen meadow – a rare habitat needing careful management to avoid succession by brambles and scrubby trees. An enthusiastic group of twelve volunteers ('The Wyngworkers') meets twice a month from October to March to carry out scrub clearance, ditch maintenance, meadow management, pond and dyke dredging and general upkeep of the reserve.

Practical tasks are restricted during spring and summer when birds nest and the meadow is in full glory, with its wide range of plants and insects. The team organises monthly social activities, such as bird watching, bat detecting and plant and fungi identification.

Paul said "I came to Norfolk in 1978 to study Environmental Sciences at UEA. After nearly 40 years I am on the cusp of achieving 'naturalised Norfolk' status – but people can still recognize my Nottinghamshire accent!"

Fund raising team honoured with civic award

A civic award was presented to Wymondham couple Jennifer and Jim Cawte at a ceremony held at the Wymondham Dell Bowls Club by the town's mayor Joe Mooney.

Mr Mooney said "Jennifer and Jim are a great local fund raising team. They have over many years managed to raise thousands of pounds for local good causes. They are a credit to Wymondham and they are in my view very worthy recipients of this year's Wymondham Town Council Civic award".

In May 2016 they set off in their 1983 Morris Ital post office van from Wymondham to John O'Groats, Lands' End and back to Wymondham. They managed to raise a staggering £4,350 for the new EACH children's hospice near Norwich.

Jennifer and Jim said "We are thrilled and honoured to have received this award. We both enjoy fundraising, and community service has been a large part of our life since Jim joined the Wymondham Lions Club in 1978".

Shop Director and volunteer Trevor Ellingworth commented that when the volunteers who run the shop first took it on, they had no idea how it would develop. "We created the logo before we even had keys to the shop. It serves us very well, but we're more than just a bookshop now. We want our brand to reflect our versatility and interaction with the community."

Tracy Kenny, Manager and Director, echoed his thinking. "Many people know us because of our work with children, and our children's section is our biggest area of investment. Because of our great relationship with schools, teachers have asked to be able to let pupils submit their book reviews on our website. We'll be using the funds to create that kind of tool, to allow readers across all ages and locations to be part of our community."

Any remaining funds will go to support the shop's off-site book fairs. In March this year they moved 300 books to 15 events at 12 schools in 10 days.

As part of the celebrations the shop were invited to a reception with HarperCollins in London, where they were introduced to other independent booksellers, as well as buyers from Tesco, Sainsburys, and even Amazon. Tracy Kenny added "I sat down next to a woman who turned out to be the buyer from Amazon. It was like looking the challenge of internet sales in the eye. So I gave her a copy of our annual report and told her our story. It may not have made a difference, but they know we're here!"



Town Team going back in time again for Vintage Day

Following the amazing success of last year's Vintage Day, Wymondham Town Team are set to repeat the event on Sunday 10 September.

As well as a host of classic cars, vintage stalls and Memory Lane displays, this year also sees a cake competition, tea dances at Central Hall, fun and games for children at Priory Gardens, the return of the popular vintage bus and a double decker bus too! The ever popular Mid-Norfolk Railway will be running steam train journeys to and from Dereham from Wymondham Abbey station.

Music will again be expertly provided by Those Darn Mouldy Figs, whose jazz added a mellow sound to the event last year, and members of Cawston Brass Band will also be performing on the day.

Steam's up on the Mid Norfolk Railway



There's a busy season looming on the Mid-Norfolk Railway (MNR), East Anglia's longest heritage railway. Steam train services recommenced for the summer season at the end of May, with the annual Steam Gala Weekend from June 23rd – 25th, with visiting locomotives in action alongside the line's regular summer performer, Great Western-designed 0-6-0 Pannier Tank locomotive No 9466.

The line, operated almost entirely by volunteer staff, is always looking for additional helpers, and whatever your skills, we have jobs that need doing: not just running trains – and keeping them running - but helping us with our wide-ranging events programme too.

Take the train from Wymondham Abbey Halt to Dereham for the Blues Festival on 8 July, or to Dereham Carnival on 16 July. There'll be Classic Cars on display at Dereham Station on 23 July, and then our 1940s Weekend on 5 and 6 August will have events running at both ends of the line, and at the intermediate stations too. The annual Ales by Rails event takes place over August Bank Holiday weekend, combining the best real ales and cider with steam trains!

As well as these events, there are regular Fish & Chip dining trains from Dereham through the summer, Folk and Jazz music trains, and cream teas are served aboard the steam train on most Sunday afternoons, with full high teas available on some Saturdays too.

These dining options and special trains do require advance booking.
