DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST AT MEETINGS

When declaring an interest at a meeting Members are asked to indicate whether their interest in the matter is pecuniary, or if the matter relates to, or affects a pecuniary interest they have, or if it is another type of interest. Members are required to identify the nature of the interest and the agenda item to which it relates. In the case of other interests, the member may speak and vote. If it is a pecuniary interest, the member must withdraw from the meeting when it is discussed. If it affects or relates to a pecuniary interest the member has, they have the right to make representations to the meeting as a member of the public but must then withdraw from the meeting. Members are also requested when appropriate to make any declarations under the Code of Practice on Planning and Judicial matters.

Have you declared the interest in the register of interests as a pecuniary interest? If Yes, you will need to withdraw from the room when it is discussed.

Does the interest directly:

- 1. affect yours, or your spouse / partner's financial position?
- 2. relate to the determining of any approval, consent, licence, permission or registration in relation to you or your spouse / partner?
- 3. Relate to a contract you, or your spouse / partner have with the Council
- 4. Affect land you or your spouse / partner own
- 5. Affect a company that you or your partner own, or have a shareholding in

If the answer is "yes" to any of the above, it is likely to be pecuniary.

Please refer to the guidance given on declaring pecuniary interests in the register of interest forms. If you have a pecuniary interest, you will need to inform the meeting and then withdraw from the room when it is discussed. If it has not been previously declared, you will also need to notify the Monitoring Officer within 28 days.

Does the interest indirectly affect or relate any pecuniary interest you have already declared, or an interest you have identified at 1-5 above?


If yes, you need to inform the meeting. When it is discussed, you will have the right to make representations to the meeting as a member of the public, but must then withdraw from the meeting.

Is the interest not related to any of the above? If so, it is likely to be an other interest. You will need to declare the interest, but may participate in discussion and voting on the item.

Have you made any statements or undertaken any actions that would indicate that you have a closed mind on a matter under discussion? If so, you may be predetermined on the issue; you will need to inform the meeting, and when it is discussed, you will have the right to make representations to the meeting as a member of the public, but must then withdraw from the meeting.

Management of Parks and Open Spaces & Cooperation with Volunteers Discussion Paper for LEET Committee 17 Jan 2022

Improvements to parks in Wymondham are being planned over the coming years – Browick Park, Rothbury Park, Becketswell and Chandlers Hill Garden and the issue of on-going maintenance has been raised.

Current situation: Parks and open spaces are maintained by the Town Council's team of groundsmen, who report directly to the Town Clerk. The grass is mown regularly and greenery is cut back seasonally. They previously also dealt with the path at Kett's Park Wood and the trees at the sides of the main sports pitches but these have been managed by Greening Wymondham volunteers for the last five years, with Norwich Fringe Project employed by the Town Council to lead the work days. In other cases (Priory Gardens, Chandlers Hill and Chain Entry) a volunteer has spent many hours nurturing the planting, with the Council Team mowing the grass and trimming the bushes.

Wymondham in Bloom - A team of volunteers has raised the Town's annual effort from hanging baskets to more sophisticated and attractive planters, with significant success in the awards from the regional competition Anglia in Bloom. However the question of maintaining high quality planting needs an increased level of knowledge and coordination with the Council, particularly for the 34 Amberol planters.

Going forward - There is no doubt that the cost of maintaining public open spaces and planted areas is a problem for Local Authorities whose budgets have been drastically curtailed by Government cut backs. If the ambition to bring about improvements is to be realised we must take the chance to review how the parks can be better managed for biodiversity, cutting carbon emissions and boosting community wellbeing and mental health. We do not doubt that the Council's grounds maintenance team is kept busy but nevertheless the maintenance is the minimum that you would expect in public spaces. However with the hoped for improvements to the parks there will obviously be a demand for a higher level of maintenance, in particular of newly planted trees, bushes and perennials. The question is how can high quality planting and landscaping best be maintained by the Council, at reasonable cost?

Towards a solution – Should the Council expand its Grounds Maintenance Team and/or can ways be found to coordinate the efforts of volunteers to enhance the level of maintenance? Volunteers can form part of the solution but management and organisation needs to be considered. The volunteer leaders of successful projects such as the Christmas Lights, Wynterfest, Wymondham in Bloom, Kett's Park Wood and Browick Community Orchard have felt that the pressure on them is unsustainable.

Conclusions - As Wymondham grows, residents are right to demand that their public spaces are looked after to a high standard. At present we do not know enough to set out a course of action. We suggest that it would be useful to find out what is done at other Councils, so that an assessment can be made on what would achieve the best result for our town. A sub-committee of volunteers and Councillors could be delegated to do this research and report back to the full LEET committee in due course.
