The flowchart below gives a simple guide to declaring an interest under the code.




Table 1: Disclosable Pecuniary Interests

This table sets out the explanation of Disclosable Pecuniary Interests as set out in the

Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012.

Subject	Description
Employment, office, trade, profession or vocation	Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
Sponsorship	Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from the council) made to the councillor during the previous 12-month period for expenses incurred by him/her in carrying out his/her duties as a councillor, or towards his/her election expenses. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.
Contracts	Any contract made between the councillor or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/civil partners (or a firm in which such person is a partner, or an incorporated body of which such person is a director* or a body that such person has a beneficial interest in the securities of*) and the council
	(a) under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed; and (b) which has not been fully discharged
Land and Property	Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of the council. 'Land' excludes an easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not give the councillor or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/ civil partners (alone or jointly with another) a right to occupy or to receive income.
Licenses	Any licence (alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of the council for a month or longer

Corporate tenancies	Any tenancy where (to the councillor's knowledge)— (a) the landlord is the council; and (b) the tenant is a body that the councillor, or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/ civil partners is a partner of or a director* of or has a beneficial interest in the securities* of.
Securities	Any beneficial interest in securities* of a body where— (a) that body (to the councillor's knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of the council; and (b) either— (i) the total nominal value of the securities* exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body; or (ii) If the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which the councillor, or his/ her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/civil partners have a beneficial interest exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

Table 2: Other Registrable Interests

You must register as an Other Registerable Interest:

- a) any unpaid directorships
- b) any body of which you are a member or are in a position of general control or management and to which you are nominated or appointed by your authority
- c) any body
 - (i) exercising functions of a public nature
 - (ii) directed to charitable purposes or
 - (iii) one of whose principal purposes includes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union) of which you are a member or in a position of general control or management

WYMONDHAM MARK Cllr. Baker outlined his paper to bring in a 'Wymondham Mark' to provide support and infrastructure for local volunteer groups and organisations. The LEET committee would establish the criteria to receive a 'Mark' and would determine which groups would be accepted. The Council needs to have a structure in place and could control who uses resources by putting checks and balances in place. Cllr. Nixon responded outlining work the Council had undertaken in the Town and raising concerns that a 'Mark' would create a 2 tier elitist system and that the Council should be inclusive and progressive not elitist. The effect of loss of income to other small room hirers was pointed out, which could cause them to close if the Council offered free meeting rooms.

Upon the proposition of Cllr. Baker and seconded by Cllr. Doheny the following motion was proposed:

The Council

- a) Requests that the Town Clerk prepare a report containing details of:
- Spaces to which access is controlled by Wymondham Town Council
- Sources of water accessible from outside buildings which are controlled and paid for by Wymondham Town Council
- Sources of electricity accessible from outside building which are controlled and paid for by Wymondham Town Council
- Any other inventory or services he deems may be useful to community groups.
- b) Resolves to create the "Wymondham Mark" to grant community groups, charities or individuals the right to access these services without charge
- c) Directs the LEET Committee to determine:
- 1. Which resources to which mark-holders should have access
- 2. The extent to which mark-holders should have access to these resources
- 3. The criteria the above groups or individuals must satisfy to be awarded the mark
- 4. The process through which groups or individuals must go to be awarded the mark
- 5.. Criteria upon which the above groups or individuals may have the mark removed and the process for doing this
- 6. Suitable monitoring of usage of the above resources

LETTERS TO HEAVEN – PROPOSAL FOR WYMONDHAM'S CEMETERY



1. Overview

'Letters to Heaven' is a concept started in 2023 by a then 9-year-old girl. It aims to help the bereaved cope with their grief. The grieving can write and post letters, cards and drawings to a lost loved one in special post boxes installed in cemeteries and crematoria nationwide. Cllr Nuri-Nixon was recently contacted by Wymondham resident Lisa who asked if WTC would consider installing one of these post boxes in the town's cemetery on Cemetery Lane. Cllr James had spotted the practice in the news last year and discussed it with Cllr Nuri-Nixon then; Lisa's message has prompted action now.

2. Key Points:

- Several privately run crematoria and councils countrywide offer this service including:
 Aylesbury, Bedford, Cromer, Chesterfield, Colchester, Mansfield, Melton, Rushden, Saltash,
 Witney and Workington.
- b. The lockable post boxes are often painted white to differentiate them from Royal Mail boxes. They are emptied and maintained by the relevant crematorium/council staff. We recommend an extra sign additional to the post box door sign is added to the box or fixed nearby to make it clear it is **not** a Royal Mail post box and that no stamp is necessary.
- c. When letters are collected by council staff it is important that confidentiality is maintained. Research indicates the bereaved seem to care most that their letters are NOT opened or read; it is the acts of writing and posting that give comfort. Many operators now collect the letters and shred them, unopened, for composting. The resultant compost is then used at the cemetery. Some places mix the compost with wild flower seed thus continuing life. This is also in keeping with our biodiversity and sustainability policies and we recommend Wymondham Town Council adopts this method.
- d. The service is available to all, not just those with loved ones buried in the cemetery.
- e. If the post box is considered successful we recommend a second post box is installed in our new cemetery.

3. Purchase Options and Costs:

Three examples are below. All are supplied with a stand, are lockable and supplied with keys.

Kett's Day 475 - A celebration of Robert Kett's rebellion on the 475th anniversary

This proposal is to ratify the spending of monies to provide activities for families and children to enjoy at a community picnic on Sunday July 7th. We have kindly been donated a sum of £1433.54 by the Wood family in order to be able to put on a community event and anything over this amount will be topped up from the Mayor's fund.

What, where, when?

Sunday July 7th at Kett's Park. A community picnic where people can bring along their own picnic blankets and lunches and enjoy an afternoon in our lovely park. There will be fairground rides, a children's crafting activity, a performance of 'The Widow Kett', a medieval sword fighting demonstration including interactive activities and a Kett's themed walk with the Wymondham Walkers.

Fairground rides:

Tea cups, roundabout, inflatable slide.

Cost to hire: £1200 (This provides unlimited free rides for all children)

Stall offering sweets, ice-cream and candyfloss for those who wish to purchase any treats.

Main Hall at Kett's Park:

The main hall has been booked in order to provide a location for the performance of 'The Widow Kett' and also as a bad weather contingency for the sword fighting activity to take place indoors.

Cost to hire: £60

The small café and toilet facilities will also be available in this building.

Sword Fighting:

Two hours of medieval sword fighting including a demonstration and interactive activities for children aged 6+

Cost to hire: £500

Wymondham Wild Tribe:

Kett's themed crafting activity for children aged 3 - 8 years to make their own mobiles using natural materials such as feathers, oak leaves and acorns.

Cost: £50 requested to purchase additional crafting materials such as beads and thread

Wymondham Walkers

A walk for adults starting and finishing at the Robert Kett pub which will take in various Kett related road names in North Wymondham.
